
ZENTANGLE HAND SILHOUETTE

with tinted color background




TINTING AND SHADING

In color theory, a tint is the mixture of a color with white, which increases lightness.


A shade is the mixture of a color with black, which reduces lightness.

Mixing a color with any neutral color including black, gray, or white reduces the colorfulness.



ABOUT ZENTANGLES FOUNDING ARTISTS

The zentangle method was invented by Rick Roberts and Maria Thomas when they discovered that the act of drawing abstract patterns with the constraint of different rules was extremely meditative.



ABOUT ZENTANGLES

Zentangle drawing is easy-to-learn, relaxing, and a fun way to create beautiful images by drawing patterns inside a boundary called a **Border**.

The border is broken up into segments with **Strings**. We draw our patterns inside these segments.

These patterns are called **Tangles**. You create Tangles with combinations of **dots**, **lines**, **simple curves**, **S**-curves and **orbs**.



ABOUT ZENTANGLES

No erasing is allowed in creating Zentangle art.

•We have no eraser in life -- if our pen marks aren't initially what we might have intended we can use them as inspirations to go in directions that we may not have otherwise explored.

• Instead of looking at them as mistakes, we think them as "opportunities" and use them as the foundation for an unexpected pattern.



HOW A ZENTANGLE IS DIFFERENT

The Zentangle method is very different from regular drawing, painting and other art forms.


- It is meant to be a form of artistic meditation that anyone can do.
- Its creation is **unplanned** -You don't need to know what a tangle is going to look like to draw it.
- Its creation of a Zentangle drawing is **deliberate**, yet unexpected. Each stroke should be made deliberately, rather than hesitantly.



ZENTANGLE HAND SILHOUETTE

- Pick desired color
- Write your name on the back of the watercolor paper and cardstock paper





TRACE HAND

Trace hand on 9x12 cardstock paper and set aside for later

Do <u>NOT</u> press too hard - you don't want to see the lines when you are done with your Zentangle



TRACE HAND

On 9x12 watercolor paper - trace same hand again in the same position or "pose"


Do <u>NOT</u> press too hard - you don't want to see the lines when you are done with the painting



TRACE HAND

On the watercolor paper, lightly trace 3 more outlines about a half inch apart (the width of your thumb) around your hand silhouette. Think of these as gloves on your hand – three on each









Start with white and add **two** drops of your desired color.





Gently and thoroughly mix paint and apply a medium-heavy coat to your first stripe or "glove"



Add **four** more drops of color.





Gently and thoroughly mix and apply a medium-heavy coat to your **second** stripe or "glove"



Add twelve more drops.

Note: more drops may be needed to increase contrast





Gently and thoroughly mix and apply a medium-heavy coat to your **third** stripe or "glove"




Add twenty-four more drops.

Note: more drops may be needed to increase contrast



Mix and then paint the rest of the paper, but NOT the middle of the hand.



Set your paper aside to dry.

Wipe up any paint that might have gotten onto the table.

Clean your brush.


Throw away your cup.



Draw **Strings** representing the creases in your hand

Look at the palm of your non-writing hand and **lightly** copy the creases that you see onto the silhouette.


These will be our **Strings**.



Draw your **Tangles**.

The drawing should be completed in **black ink**.

You create Tangles with combinations of dots, lines, simple curves, S-curves, and orbs.



Draw your Tangles.

They are non-representational and unplanned so you can focus on each stroke and not worry about the result.

It **should not** be representative of any certain recognizable object; rather, it should be **abstract**.




Draw your Tangles.

You will know when you're done!



Shade your Tangles.

When you're done with your Tangles, go in and shade some parts with your pencil to give parts of the Zentangle a 3-dimensional look.




If there is time, cut out your Zentangle hand





And glue your cutout onto tinted paint outlines
